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# MOCA CLIMATE CONVERSATIONS SERIES DEBUTS SEPTEMBER 30TH

SERIES EXPLORES THE URGENT AND INTERSECTING ISSUES AROUND CLIMATE, CULTURE, AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

**LOS ANGELES**—The Museum of Contemporary Art (MOCA) is proud to launch MOCA Climate Conversations this September. Bringing together writers, scientists, artists, activists, historians, and educators, the series features conversations that explore the urgent and intersecting issues of climate breakdown, human health, and social justice. The MOCA Climate Conversations series will create a space for learning and action by engaging pressing topics and inspiring awareness around climate, culture, and environmental justice.

MOCA Climate Conversations debuts on September 30th with the *Fluid States* symposium, which takes place in the Ahmanson Auditorium at MOCA Grand Avenue from 11 am to 4:30 pm. Attendees will engage in two

thought-provoking sessions, starting with "Artist-led Activism," which will explore the intricate connections between creative practice, placemaking, and ecological justice, followed by "Coastal Communities", which will examine ancient narratives of encroaching water, discuss projections of coastal change, and offer insights on vital adaptations needed to protect our planet.

Participants include Executive Director of Sky High Farm, Josh Bardfield; artists Dan Colen and Emma Robbins; curators Laura Copelin, Adrianne Ramsey, and Isabella Robbins; scholars Kristina Hill and Benjamin Strauss; Cultural Roots Nursery founder Li Schmidt; and Sarah Workneh, Co-Director of Skowhegan School of Painting & Sculpture, among others. The series is organized by Kelsey Shell, MOCA's Environmental & Sustainability Strategist, with Alitzah Oros, Public Programming Associate.

MOCA Climate Conversations continue throughout the fall. On October 12th, the series features a screening of artist Regina de Miguel's film *Catábasis*, followed by a conversation. On November 16, MOCA Climate Conversations presents a screening of *Canary*, a documentary about climate scientist Dr Lonnie Thompson, followed by a dialogue with the filmmakers. On December 3rd, the second symposium of the season, *Urban Ecologies*, will bring together artists Jessa Calderon and Carolina Caycedo, journalist Adam Mahoney, and scholar Karen Seto, among others.

MOCA Climate Conversations are part of MOCA's environmental programming–an extension of the museum's efforts around climate, conservation, and environmental justice. Guided by the work of the MOCA Environmental Council, the first sustainability council at a major arts museum in the United States, environmental programming at MOCA presents artists, activists, and scholars committed to critical ecological issues in Los Angeles and globally.
